News UPDATES

In February, RDI celebrated the winter 2024 Graduate Students Welcome and Welcome Back Reception with students, staff and faculty. The occasion celebrated the growth of the Diploma and MA programs in Rural Development. Currently, the department has 34 students and strong research connections and partnerships in Ghana, Peru, Mexico, and Europe. The gathering aimed to welcome our students and also to celebrate these achievements to foster a sense of community within the department.



The applied research projects undertaken by the Rural Development Institute seek to revitalize rural communities by addressing the unique challenges they face. The Rural Capacity Building Project seeks to address these situations by designing a series of capacity building pathways that would enhance rural community development. The Rural Development Institute has partnered with Endow Manitoba to explore community understandings of the Canadian Index of Well-being (CIW). The project will employ a community-based research approach, drawing on a think-tank-style session. The objective is to reflect on how these foundations can utilize a well-being framework in their operations, particularly in the areas of grant-making and strategic initiatives. 
