FINANCE MANAGER

Job Type: Full-time (1.0 FTE)

Under the direction of the Secretary-Treasurer, the Finance Manager is responsible for: managing the finance and payroll departments; directing the division's accounting and financial reporting operations; establishing financial policies, practices and controls; ensuring organizational compliance with internal and external financial standards; leading the development and operation of a risk management program; managing the verification and reporting process; directing the provision of accounting services for capital funds and school based funds; coordinating the divisional charity fund; overseeing accounts payable and accounts receivable; and working with operational departments and educational administrators to follow the division's policies and procedures.

Responsibilities:

- Lead an Accounting and Payroll Services Department;
- Ensure systems are current and appropriate to the reporting needs of the division;
- Lead the accounting function of the division, including, but not limited to: day-to-day cash flow and investment transactions, provincial government grants, payroll and financial reporting systems;
- Lead the development and implementation of operational plans, goals and objectives, and priorities for the Secretary-Treasurer Department;
- Lead the delivery of cost-effective accounting and financial reporting systems, policies and processes to meet the current and future needs of the division;
- Lead the development, implementation and ongoing operation of a formal risk management program to identify, analyze, and manage and balance risks to the division;
- Assist the Secretary-Treasurer with Provincial reports;
- Assist the Secretary-Treasurer with preparing financial reports for internal and external users;



- Lead and participate in preparing month end statements and annual financial statements;
- Lead the audit and tax activities of the division;
- Coordinate with external auditors to ensure that financial and operational controls and policies are complied with, and that financial and operational risks are identified and analyzed, and appropriate mitigation steps are taken;
- Lead annual audit which includes preparing working papers and coordinating the collection of information for schools and departments;
- Oversee the annual division-wide student enrolment data collection, verification and reporting processes; the provision of accounting services for the division's capital funds projects and school based non-purpose funds; third party billing for out-of-province students and additional programming; and other accounts receivables;
- Measure and report on operational performance to the Secretary-Treasurer and senior management/stakeholders;
- Communicate between school administrators, department managers and finance/payroll staff regarding by-law, policy or procedure application;
- Participate in the annual budget development;
- Plan staff development and training for employees to ensure competent and current skill levels;
- Perform financial analysis and generate reports on that performance;
- Develop, amend, and implement accounting policies;
- Create detailed projections;
- Review and implement audit controls;
- Serve as a key team member administering divisional accounting software;
- Ability to travel to school locations within the division and to outside organizations;
- Ability to attend various divisional meetings as required;
- Continually assess current and new methods of financial reporting to determine:
 - a. That the method of delivery of information is appropriate to the needs of the division;
 - b. The type of reporting instruments necessary for good decision making;
 - c. The effective timing of the release of relevant information.

Data collected from almost 1600 grade 9 students throughout the province show that there are serious concerns about diet quality for most of them, and 20% have food insecurity. Poor diets and food insecurity put our youth at significant risk of future physical and mental health issues and impact their ability to succeed academically.

The FANS study shows there is an urgent need to improve the overall diets of all Manitoba children, and address food insecurity in those from vulnerable families. The team hopes the FANS results can be used to develop much-needed programs and policies that will build on current efforts to improve child nutrition and food security. Key recommendations to address FANS study results are in the report.

The Holocaust Survivor Memoirs Program was established by the Azrieli Foundation in 2005 to collect, preserve and share the **memoirs and diaries** written by survivors of the Holocaust who came to Canada. We have published the stories of over 125 survivor authors. These books are read every year by students across Canada, and we have provided more than 450,000 copies of our award-winning memoirs to Canadian educators and students. These memoirs — published in both English and French and

available as print books, ebooks and PDFs — are free of charge to educational institutions across Canada. We also create a variety of bilingual educational materials, made for and tested by the teachers who use these memoirs in their classrooms.

Marc-Olivier will give a small overview of the resources offered by the Azrieli Foundation, including our thematic education programs and activities, and Re:Collection, an innovative digital resource that combines video interviews with memoir excerpts, photos and artifacts, and features interactive timelines and maps to place survivors' stories in historical and geographic context.



Lise Pinkos is Director of Programs at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights. The

Canadian Museum for Human Rights is the first Museum dedicated solely to human rights and is centered around the idea that respect and understanding of human rights can serve as a positive force for change in the world.

Lise will speak to the programs and resources offered by the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, including virtual field trips, web stories and pedagogical programs that are designed to help your students learn about human rights and be inspired to take action for human rights.

Holocaust Survivor Memoirs Program Programme des mémoires de survivants de l'Holocauste

Marc-Olivier Cloutier, directeur des initiatives en

matière d'éducation à la Fondation Azrieli. En 2005, la Fondation Azrieli a créé le Programme des mémoires de survivants de l'Holocauste afin de recueillir, de conserver et de distribuer les **mémoires et journaux intimes** rédigés par des personnes ayant survécu à l'Holocauste qui ont immigré au Canada. Nous avons publié les récits de plus de 125 auteur·e·s survivant·e·s. Ces livres sont lus chaque année par des élèves partout au Canada et nous avons fourni plus de 450 000 copies de nos mémoires primés aux enseignant·e·s et élèves canadiens. Ces mémoires, publiés en anglais et en français et offerts sous forme de livres imprimés, de livres électroniques et de fichiers PDF, sont distribués gratuitement aux établissements d'enseignement du Canada. Nous créons également une variété de matériel pédagogique bilingue, conçu et testé par les enseignant·e·s qui utilisent ces mémoires dans leurs classes.

Marc donnera un petit aperçu des ressources offertes par la Fondation Azrieli, y compris nos programmes et activités éducatives thématiques, et Re:Collection, une ressource numérique innovante qui combine des vidéos d'entretien avec des extraits de mémoires, des photos et des artéfacts, et qui propose des chronologies et cartes interactives permettant de placer les parcours des survivant·e·s dans leurs contextes historique et géographique.
