Paving the Way for Two New Schools in Waverley West

As the Pembina Trails community continues to grow, we were thrilled to hear the news that we would be getting two new schools: a kindergarten to grade 8 school to accommodate 800 students and a grade 9-12 school to serve 1,200.

Julie Fisher, Chair of the Board, said that hearing the news, shared by Premier Brian Pallister at the budget announcement on March 12, 2018, was one of her most memorable moments of the school year. "I am thrilled for our community," she said. "The high school will have a huge impact on all our students living in the south end of the division."

Pembina Trails' trustees and senior administration team have been working for many years with city and provincial officials on plans for these schools, proposing an innovative community campus site that will be an accessible, convenient hub for the Bridgwater neighbourhood.

Construction on the schools is set to begin in 2019, with the goal of opening the site by 2021.

Welcoming New Students in Charleswood

We are also pleased to see communities in Charleswood, including RidgeWood West and Scotswood Meadows grow. Students living here will be welcomed at our existing neighbourhood schools. Check out our school locator tool at www.pembinatrails.ca to find your school.

Demonstrating Our Commitment to Truth and Reconciliation

LEARNING FROM ELDER WINSTON WUTTUNEE

We are honoured to have Winston Wuttunee recently join Pembina Trails as our Official Elder in Residence. He has already become a familiar face and has been busy building relationships with students and staff across the division.

Winston was born in Battleford, Saskatchewan, and is a proud member of the Red Pheasant Cree Nation.

He is a talented Juno-nominated and award winning musician, yet Winston remains humble. He believes some of his most rewarding work has been connecting with young people. He has taught and developed curriculum for university courses, developed music resources and collaborated with other writers and academics in books and through presentations at more than 2,500 schools, universities and conferences.

Some of his most important work so far has been offering guidance, support and cultural teachings to Indigenous students. "I fell in love with a life of helping," Winston says. "I realized I never had a job that made me feel so good as working with these children."

JOINING THE JOURNEY OF RECONCILIATION

June 20, 2017, was a historic day in our city as more than 80 local organizations signed Winnipeg's Indigenous Accord. We were proud to join the unified commitment to the Journey of Reconciliation and look forward to being part of how the story unfolds.

Our Board Chair, Julie Fisher, signed the Accord during an official ceremony at Oodena Celebration Circle at the Forks. Pembina Trails also attended the city's second annual Indigenous Accord ceremony in June 2018.

SHARING STORIES AND MAKING CHANGE AT OUR FIRST INDIGENOUS CAMP

In 2017-18 we were pleased to offer Manitoba's first-ever Indigenous Youth Leadership Development camps. The camps, held once in the fall and once in the spring, gave Indigenous students a unique three-day opportunity to explore nature, celebrate their culture and build solid leadership skills outside of the classroom, deep in the woods at Fort Whyte Alive.

Students spent the three days learning songs and traditions, sharing personal stories and working on action plans in the hopes of making positive change in their communities.

"I feel motivated," said Darren, a 17-year-old student at Fort Richmond Collegiate. "We are all helping each other and learning new things."

Seventeen-year-old Shaquille Ducharme from Vincent Massey feels the same. "I like how the youth can come together here and how we can hear each other's stories," she says.

Parents have also been impressed by the camps. "I think this is a great program for our Indigenous youth to touch base with who they are, especially because of reconciliation and them not really knowing about their culture," said Mellissa Beaulieu, whose daughter, Muriel Houle, participated in the fall camp. "It is hard for us as Indigenous people to sometimes connect, so this camp gives our kids the opportunity to figure out who they are."

Since our first camps were so successful, we are looking for new ways to grow the program.

Offering Innovative Learning Opportunities at PTEC



Pembina Trails now offers students yet another exciting and innovative learning opportunity through our newest program: the Pembina Trails Early College, or PTEC for short. We are thrilled to partner with Manitoba Institute for Trades and Technology (MITT) and ICT Association of Manitoba (ICTAM) to deliver a unique high school environment.

"Pembina Trails Early College is an innovative, progressive program in our school division. It will change the way students do school," said Jane Bachart, PTEC's vice-principal.

During PTEC's four-year program, students will get the benefits of a high school education, post-secondary experience and mentorship with industry professionals. It is just one of the many initiatives introduced by our board to embrace the new ways and methods kids learn.

In grades 9 and 10, students split their day in two, working on regular courses in the morning and an accelerated technology program in the afternoon. In grade 11, they begin classes at MITT in either Software Development or Cyber Security and Cloud Administration.

"PTEC has accepted a full class of students for its inaugural year," Bachart said. "There are no limits to what these students will do!"

Many of these students enrolled for September 2018 attended our first ever Technovation Camp and got a taste of what their new program will be like. Over two days, students participated in engineering design to solve real-world problems. They used technologies such as app-development, coding, 3D design, programming and much more.

PTEC is modeled after the first P-Tech school opened in Brooklyn, NY, a number of years ago. Since then, the program has expanded to more than 100 schools in several countries. If the Pembina Trails program becomes official, we will have the first P-Tech school in Canada!

Setting Standards for Success in Literacy

One of our priorities is making sure that all our students become readers, critical thinkers and problem-solvers. That is why we have created Standards for Success in Literacy (SSL).

When students practice and develop their literacy skills – reading, writing, listening, speaking, viewing, representing and responding – they strengthen their ability to understand, think, apply and communicate in their ever-changing world and community.

In 2017-18 we began our SSL plan in six of our schools – Dalhousie, Linden Meadows, Acadia Junior High, River West Park, Westdale and Westgrove. Students in these schools use technology, such as 2-in-1 detachable Surface Pro tablets, when studying literacy and numeracy.

"It is a lot more fun to write when I am using Surface Pro!" says Samantha, a grade 4 student at Dalhousie. "My favourite thing to do is use the website Story Bird and make unique stories!"

Ibrahim, another grade 4 student at Dalhousie, enjoys using Surface Pro to play math games: "I feel like it's made me smarter!"

Spencer Pfahl, a grade 4 teacher at Dalhousie, sees what these Surface Pros do for students like Samantha and Ibrahim. "It is really engaging for the kids," she says. "They are doing things they are excited about and it is authentic learning. We are staying up to date in Pembina Trails with what kids are engaged in. Kids love technology and technology is entering their lives at an earlier age."

Heather Eby worked as the educational technology consultant during the launch of this project and she agrees that teachers have really seen an impact on student learning

and engagement. "Students are excited to use the devices, as this is part of their world outside the classroom," says Eby. "Teachers are able to leverage the playing field with some of the Immersive Reader Assistive tools that are available through Microsoft on the Surface Pros."

Implementing the SSL program truly was a collaborative effort with consultants, schools administrators and assistant superintendents all working together. We are very proud of the results, and eventually we hope to have the program in all of our schools.

Keeping Dollars in the Classroom


After careful consideration and consultation with our community, our Board of Trustees was pleased to approve a budget for 2018-19 that will set students and staff up for success. This budget puts our 14,000 students first and keeps as many dollars as possible in the classroom.

We expect to have an additional 447 students enrol for September 2018 – 3.4 per cent more than last year. To meet our schools' growing needs we are hiring 12 additional teachers. We also plan to hire more educational assistant staff to support the increasing number of students with special needs in our division.


We are committed to placing current digital technology in the hands of our learners. This includes investing in our Standards for Success in Literacy (SSL) program.

We have also invested in expanding our successful Ignite3 summer learning loss program to include a fourth school and are proud to launch an innovative Pembina Trails Early College (PTEC) program in partnership with Manitoba Institute of Trades and Technology (MITT) and the Information and Communication Technologies Association of Manitoba (ICTAM).

Where does your dollar go?




