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Welcome Message



Welcome to Vincent Massey Collegiate! We are so happy that you are here.

At Vincent Massey Collegiate, you will meet many students from different backgrounds, many of whom are newcomers like yourself. At Vincent Massey Collegiate, we want to help you to feel comfortable in your new school and to help you to be successful. It will take time for you to understand how everything here works. Try to be patient with yourself and know that many of our students have also been through a similar experience. You are always welcome to ask questions, if there is something you don't understand.

We understand that the routines of our classrooms and how we teach and learn may be different than what you are used to. Each course has a curriculum that is set by the government of Manitoba. The curriculum is a list of what each student should learn in the course. Inquiry and group work are often used in Manitoba. Teachers must follow the curriculum, but teachers also each have their own "style" and way of teaching.

Vincent Massey includes a foods lab, woodworking shop, drama theatre, fitness centre, a newly renovated library and a state-of-the-art video production and graphics studio. WIFI access is readily available to all students.





Calendar

Our school year is divided into 2 semesters.

Semester 1: September – January

Semester 2: February – June

Most classes last for one semester. Some classes have an exam at the end of the semester.

Timetable

Our school day is made up of 5 periods. Each period is an individual course with a different teacher. Attendance is taken in each class. Some classes run outside the timetable either before or after school or during lunch. Classes are 70 minutes long. There are no breaks between classes. Students are expected to be seated and ready to learn at the start of each class.

Student Responsibilities

- Our school has bells. You are expected to listen to the bells and to get to class on time.
- Students at VMC are responsible for their own learning.
- You have to do the homework and assignments each day.
- The teacher will give you due dates. It is your responsibility to get your work done on time.
- Your daily work matters just as much as your tests and exams.
- You will get marks for your assignments AND your tests and exams.
- If you are absent from a class, it is your responsibility to talk to your teacher(s) and complete the work that you missed.
- We expect each student to do their own work. Students who copy the work of others, either from another student or from a book or the Internet will receive a 0 %.



Translators and Al



Your teachers expect you to do your work without using translators or Al because it helps you learn better.

When students only use translators or AI, they miss out on the opportunity to practice and improve their own language abilities, including vocabulary, grammar, and critical thinking. It's like using a cheat sheet instead of learning the material yourself.

Also, these tools might not always give you the right answers. By doing your work without them, you become better at English and learn more effectively.



School Supplies

Students should bring the following supplies with them to school:

- Backpack
- Binder and lined loose leaf paper
- Pens or Pencils
- Eraser
- Water bottle
- Indoor Runners
- Clothing to change into for gym (shorts, Tshirt, sweats, etc.)

Lockers

All students will be given a locker by the office to store their books, belongings, jackets, etc. Each locker already has a combination lock and sometimes you must share the locker with another student. Students have to use the lock given by the school. Students should not share their locker combination with others. Valuables should not be left in your locker.




GETTING TO SCHOOL



There are no school buses for high school students in Winnipeg. You will need to find a way to school on your own. If you live too far away from the school to walk and cannot drive or get dropped off, you can take public transportation. Public transportation in Winnipeg is called Transit.

- Bus passes, and tickets can be purchased at many stores such as *Shoppers Drug Mart or 7-11.*
- Go to winnipegtransit.com/en/navigo to plan out your bus route.



EDSBY

Edsby puts all the important school information onto a single platform. Edsby lets you view attendance, assignments, course work, parent-teacher interviews, school communication, and report cards. There is a desktop version and an app version on smartphones. Edsby is also available in many different languages. Both **students and parents** can access Edsby. Parents will receive an email from the school to set up an account. Please check both your inbox and junk mail folder.



Log In

Every student at Vincent Massey Collegiate will be given a login name and password. You can use this to log in to EDSBY and any computer in the building. You can also use it to log into any Microsoft app on a smartphone.

In general, your login will be a username based on the first letter of your first name, followed by your last name. Example: if your name is Mohammad Amin, your username would likely be MAmin.

If you ever forget your password, you can go to the library's desk and ask them to reset it. **Getting Help**

In Canada, you might find that you may have to work harder than you have ever worked before in school. You will be learning English, new content, and a new culture all at once. You will need to ask for help when you don't understand something. This is totally O.K., and even expected!



- Peer tutoring is available for free.
- Go for extra help. Math tutoring with an EA is available at lunch in room 102 for free.
- Talk to your EAL resource teacher or school counsellor.
- Connect with other students and form a study group.

Attendance

If you are sick or need to be away from school, your parent/guardian must tell the school. Your parent/guardian should use Edsby let the school know that you will be away.

Students under 18 are NOT allowed to report their own absences. If an absence is not excused, the teacher will think you are skipping the class. If you skip too many classes, you may be withdrawn from the course. Attendance is a very important part of your success in school! If you miss a class, it is YOUR responsibility to see the teacher(s) and complete any missed work.

Report Cards

How often will I get a report card?

Most courses at Vincent Massey Collegiate last only one semester. You will get two report cards per semester. One report card in the middle of the semester and one at the end of the semester.

What is a passing grade?

In Manitoba schools, students are given a grade out of 100%. A passing grade is 50%. You must earn at least 50% to get a credit for the course.

How do I earn marks towards my final grade?

Each course is different. Your teacher will explain what you must do to earn marks for their course. Usually, it will include in and out-of-class assignments, projects, quizzes and tests.

What do the marks mean on my report card?

- 80% to 100% You understand the information of the course very well.
- 70% to 79% You understand the information of the course well.
- 60% to 69% You understand some course information.
- 50% to 59% You understand a limited amount of the course information.
- Below 50% You have not shown enough learning to earn credit for the course.

Students with a final grade of less than 50% are not granted course credit and must repeat the course at the same level if it is a credit they need for graduation.





GRADUATION AND CREDITS

You will need a total of 30 credits to graduate. Students are required to complete a combination of required courses (must take) and optional courses (your choice). There are specific requirements in addition to graduation requirements depending on post-secondary studies. When choosing courses, it is very important that students consider what they would like to do after high school. This is especially true for Math and Science options. If a student wishes to go into a certain program at a university or college, specific high school courses may be required.

Credits from other schools

In Canadian high schools, students earn credits for each course. Students need a minimum of 30 credits to graduate from any Manitoba High School with a regular English Diploma. Some credits (17) are compulsory/mandatory, meaning you MUST take them. Some credits (13) are elective/optional, meaning you can choose the courses based on your interests. Many of our newcomer students arrive in the middle (or end) of their high school year. If this is your case, you may be assigned to a certain number of "out of province" credits, to account for some of the schooling you have already done in your home country.

Special Language Credit Exams

You can earn up to 4 high school credits for your first language. The Special Language Exams are held once per year usually in December.

- The exams are taken at a different school in the evening or on the weekend.
- Listen for announcements for dates and deadlines
- You must apply to write these exams. Paperwork must be completed and handed in ahead of time in September.
- There is a fee of approximately \$75

E-Courses Adaptations

Reporting on progress of EAL Students:

Teachers, in collaboration with an EAL Advisor, create an E-course plan for students taking
 "E" (EAL) courses when the student is in an early language learning stage.

What is the benefit of taking an "E" (EAL) Course?

• E-courses are planned for and delivered in a way that allows the EAL student to fully engage in their learning. The same curriculum is followed; however, the most important information (essential outcomes) in the course is focused on while also helping the students develop their English language skills. These courses are designed so that the students can find success as they move towards regular programming.

EAL Adaptations

Adaptations are based on an identified language learning need supported by the EAL Continuum for students who no longer require an E-Course plan.

Adaptations are:

- consistent and student-specific;
- required across multiple environments;
- allow a student to access grade level outcomes.

Example EAL Adaptations:

- A variety of formats to present content to support English language acquisition
- Additional time to process and formulate ideas, responses and written output
- Access to multilingual learning tools
- Alternate response formats to reduce written demand
- Expectations for timed tests and tasks adjusted or removed
- Class notes provided
- Opportunities to present learning in multiple ways to support English language acquisition
- Visual material, real objects, gestures, demonstrations and modelling provided
- Vocabulary and concepts are provided/pre-taught prior to content learning
