As a Division we are pleased to share this report with our community as we begin the 2023-2024 school year. This report is intended to provide our community with an update on the work of this past year, and to share and celebrate the many achievements of our students and staff that occurred during the 2022-2023 school year. It will also provide a snapshot of the planned work ahead as we continue to pursue educational excellence through challenging and enriching experiences in a safe, inclusive, and caring community.

Pembina Trails School Division saw many changes in 2022-2023. 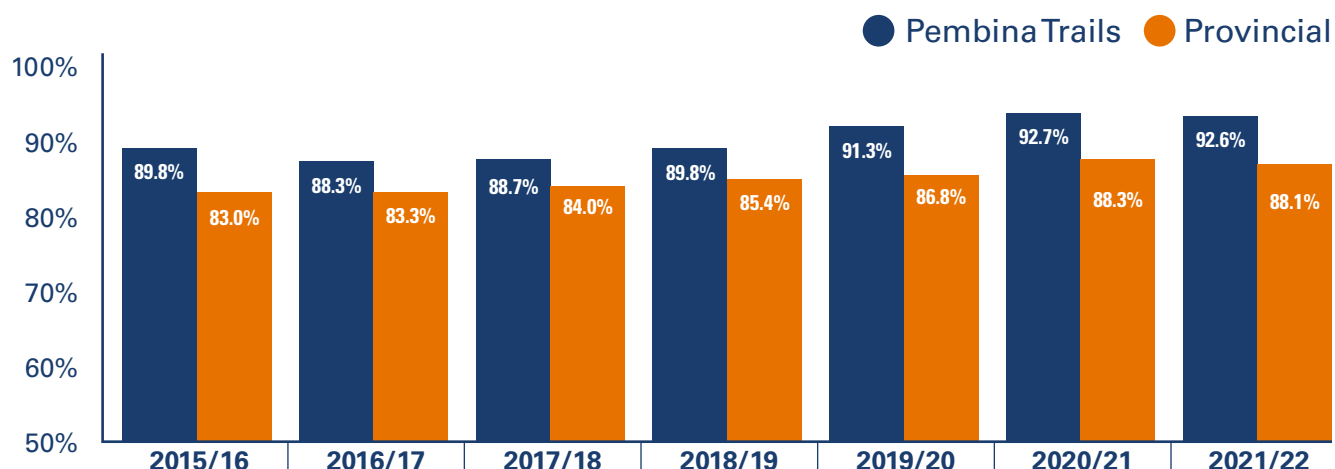

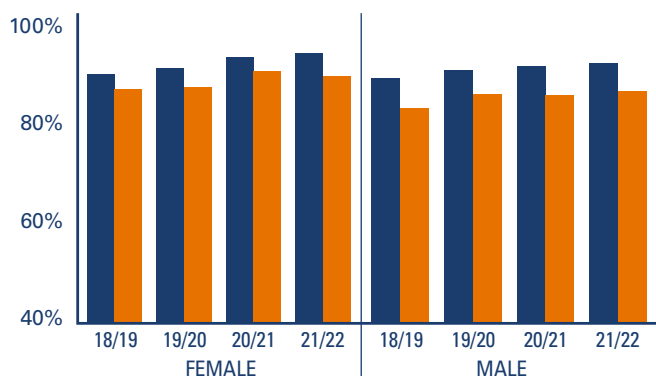
Launching our Grads

Students will be personally and intellectually engaged in learning. They will acquire the knowledge and skills to meet the demands of modern society and become good, productive global citizens.

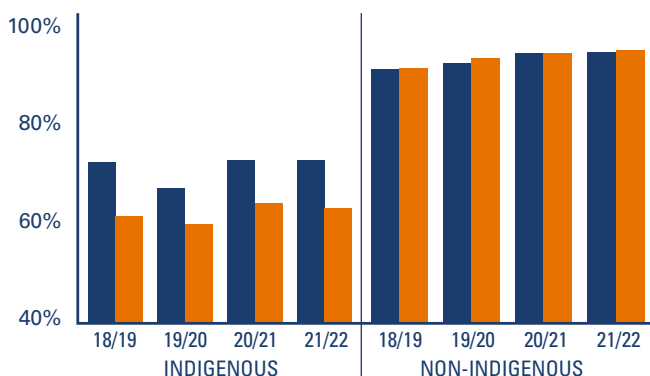
Graduation Rates (%) Overall



Graduation Rates (%) Male/Female



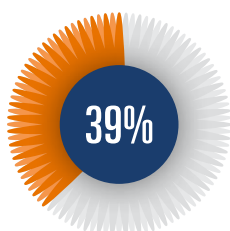
Graduation Rates (%) Indigenous/Non-Indigenous



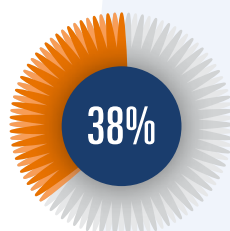
New Beginnings with Care and Concern

AREAS WHERE THE PANDEMIC CONTINUES TO CHALLENGE OR IMPACT STUDENTS



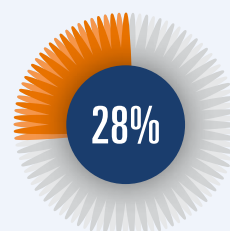

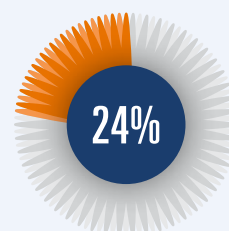

Interest in school activities

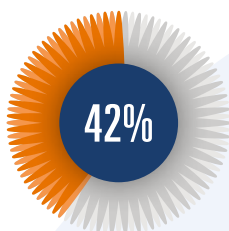

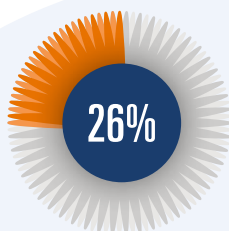

Mamàhtiwiwin:

The Wonder We Are Born With

Throughout the 2022-2023 school year, Pembina Trails' school leaders and school teams have been learning about and implementing Manitoba's Indigenous Education Policy Framework. All schools have been using the newly released framework to help describe what an Indigenous-inclusive education system could "look like" in all classrooms in Pembina Trails.

The leaders and staff of the Pembina Trails School Division recognize the importance of creating the conditions for purpose, hope, belonging and meaning through educational experiences. This framework supports our commitment and actions for all students living and learning within the school division.

In Pembina Trails, we collectively envision an education system where all students succeed, no matter where they live, their background, or their individual circumstances. Student success will look different for every child. They should be prepared to reach their full potential and to live The Good Life.

The four key strategies to support implementation include authentic involvement of Elders and Knowledge Keepers in schools; putting students at the center through respect, listening, and a holistic approach to learning; understanding of world views, values, identities, and traditions by teaching true history, cultural teachings, experiences, language, and creating the conditions for inclusive and culturally safe learning environments.

This year, we are pleased to share that each Pembina Trails High School planned a celebration entitled Kisténitākosowīn Kēsikow that acknowledged and honoured Indigenous graduates within our community.

New Beginnings – New Partnerships

Jordan's Principle

Jordan's Principle is named in memory of Jordan River Anderson, a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation. Jordan's Principle is a child first initiative intended to ensure that First Nation children do not experience denials, delays, or disruptions of public services ordinarily available to other children due to jurisdictional disputes. The goal of the initiative is to connect First Nation children and their families with quality services, supports, and resources to achieve holistic outcomes.

Our support of Jordan's Principle will ensure First Nation children and their families have access to the educational, health, and social programs and services they require.

New Beginnings – New Learning

Throughout the 2022-2023 school year, Pembina Trails' speech-language pathologists, alongside classroom teachers and school supports, assisted the speech and language skills of our learners. Since speech and language skills contribute to a solid foundation for learning and reading, supporting the skill of phonological awareness (i.e. the awareness and manipulation of speech sounds) is critical to reading development. This support was provided in various early years classrooms, small group supports, as well as professional development for classroom teachers and the school team. We will continue to build on these strategies and add to the literacy toolbox of our educators.





New Beginnings – **New Supports**

In 2023 parents and caregivers of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder came together for connection and learning. Three evening sessions at the Pembina Trail Library and Charleswood Library were offered by several Pembina Trails clinicians (i.e. social worker, speech-language pathologist and occupational therapist) and a resource teacher. The evenings covered a variety of topics and promoted a sense of community for families, allowing them to connect and realize they are not alone.

Cyber Security

With the ever-growing threats from the cyberworld, Pembina Trails IT has been working hard to shore up our security. We also partnered with Terranova to bring Cyber Security Awareness training to our staff as people are the first line of defense.

Devices

In the 2022-23 school year the Learning and Information Technologies (LIT) department deployed over 1600 devices (laptops, desktops and iPads). With a greater demand and reliance on technology Pembina Trails is working hard to ensure our schools have a ratio of three students to one device with a focus on sustainability, equity and quality. Through our evergreening process we disposed of 14,622 pounds of outdated equipment earning 295 carbon credits.

Resources for Parents & Guardians



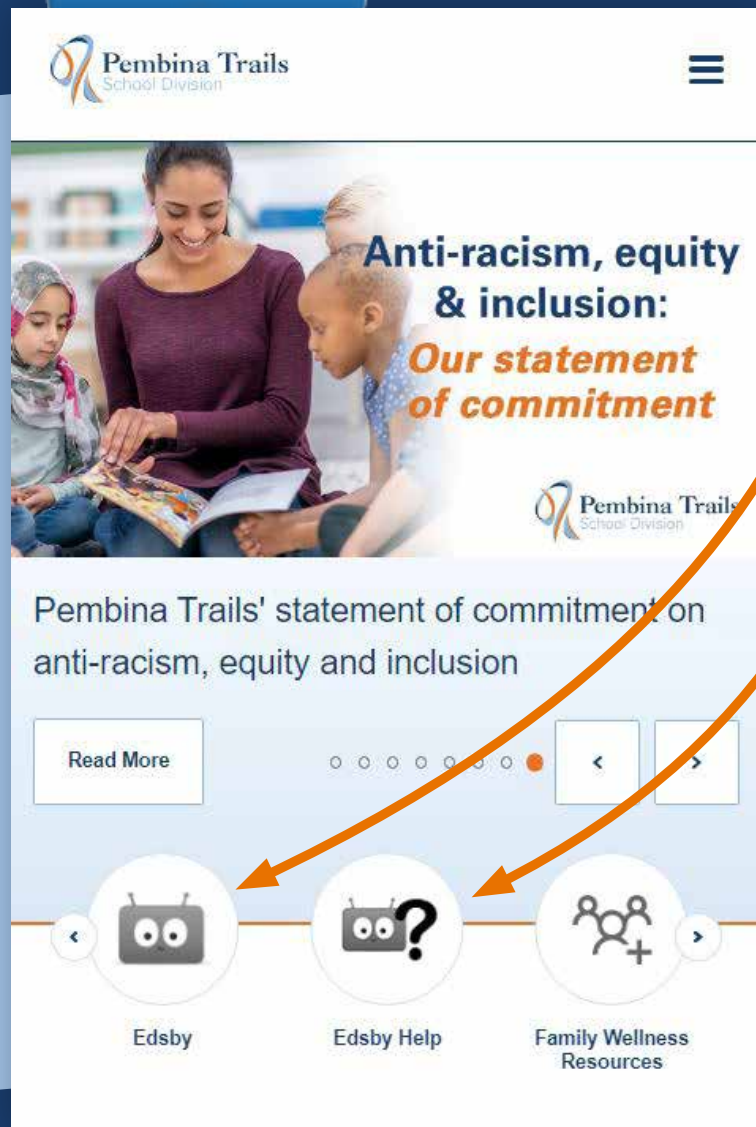
Pembina Trails School Division has been an advocate for child safety for many years. Our ongoing partnership with The Canadian Center for Child Protection (CCCP), has provided staff with ongoing education in child safety through online programming and training resources. As of March 1, 2023, all staff are required to complete the Commit to Kids Training in order to work in our schools. The past school year ushered in new additions to the Board of Trustees, Senior Administration Team, school leadership, as well as school and divisional staff. The idea of “new beginnings” is also clearly visible in our two new schools, Bison Run (K-8) and Pembina Trails Collegiate (9-12).

Bison Run opened its doors in January 2023 and offers an inspiring learning environment for our young students. From their very first steps in Kindergarten to their transition into middle school, students at Bison Run will embark on a seamless educational journey, empowered to explore, discover and thrive as they progress through their formative years.

Pembina Trails Collegiate, which opened in September 2023, caters to the unique needs of our high school students. As they navigate their crucial years of secondary education, students at PTC will be nurtured and inspired to reach their full potential, preparing them for the challenges and triumphs that lie ahead in their journey.

Bison Run and Pembina Trails Collegiate symbolize the new chapter in education that we have embarked on. We believe that education is not simply confined to the walls of a classroom but extends to creating an inclusive, supportive, and empowering community.
